### Dear Friends,

Most of you will now have noticed that the decisions you had to make last week with regard to public worship were difficult but sadly do not put an end to the matter. Our Parish churches being closed for public worship must never become the norm and if you are closed it is important to set regular review dates. Moreover, those who are still open will need to continue to monitor the situation closely so that they can remain confident that the decision they have reached continues to be the right one.

All of this adds to the strains and stresses of public ministry at a time of crisis. Don't forget that members of the Task Group remain on hand via the email address if you want advice or would like to talk things through.

At the same time there are signs that the light at the end of the tunnel is growing brighter. Infection rates in Lancashire are starting to show signs of a downward trend. The vaccination programme seems to have got off to a very impressive start in the county and many of you will have seen coverage of the mass vaccination centre set up in the crypt of our own Cathedral. This is a good time then to start dreaming some dreams for the future, and especially for what you might do in the Summer to kick off church life anew.

### **Public Worship**

Two things to note with regard to this issue:

- We have established a direct line of communication to the Directors of Public Health whose advice was instrumental for most of those who have decided to close. In the first meeting they expressed as their chief concern what they called 'end to end transmission,' in other words not just the process of worship but all the various gathering and interactions that take place surrounding it. Those of you who are still offering worship in church buildings should ensure therefore that people gather and disperse promptly with no unnecessary contact with each other.
- For those churches who are closed for public worship, we will issue some advice on how to review that decision. This will be in the form of questions to consider and will be available next week.

### Looking Out in Lent - Diocesan Online Lent Course

'Looking out in Lent' is an online Diocesan Lent Course in which we will use St Mark's Gospel to explore the how we can be a more outward-looking church as we start to move out of this pandemic. There will be five sessions:

*Week 1 : 24 February* Looking Out in Lent by: Telling the Good News

*Week 2 : 3 March* Looking Out in Lent by: Teaching the Faith

Week 3: 10 March Looking Out in Lent by: Tending to human need Week 4: 17 March Looking Out in Lent by: Transforming society

*Week 5: 24 March* Looking Out in Lent by: Treasuring creation

Each will be led by one of the Bishops or Archdeacons. They will broadcast live on the Diocesan YouTube channel at 7.30pm each Wednesday and there will also be a recorded talk from each session to use in any way you wish. Full details will be in next week's Parish Update.
