Former job before entering ministry?:

Why did you decide to get ordained?:

Answer: I have felt God's call to the priesthood for over 34 years. As a married Roman Catholic that was an interesting place to be. The realisation that I was being called to the priesthood in the Church of England took a little time to sink in!

What's been the best thing about your training?:

Answer: The placement churches, and the people I've met in and around them. In each placement, from South Shore Blackpool, Christ Church Fulwood, and the University of Cumbria to Ribchester, Hurst Green and Mitton I have encountered the Risen Christ in the people and the ministry teams that have made me welcome.

He was full of the Holy Spirit, an inspirational preacher, a deeply prayerful man, full of fun and mischief, who encouraged my ministry and when I said that I felt God was calling me to be an Anglican priest, he said "At last! Why has it taken you so long?"

What is your hope for your future role?:

Answer: To serve the people of Lytham St Cuthbert's to the best of my ability, to continue to learn and for Cathy and I to keep our relationship with God at the centre of our life.

Name one thing about you people would be surprised about?:

Answer: I used to make investigative TV documentaries.

What would you say was your most significant personal achievement to date?

Answer: I don't know whether being a loving husband and father is an achievement, but it's the thing I am most proud of.
