



New National Discernment Process for Vocations to Ordained Ministry Fact Sheet

Summary

Following a long period of review, the national approach to discerning vocations to ordained ministry in the Church of England is being transformed from September 2020. The current nine criteria are being replaced with a discernment grid focused on six qualities and BAPs are being replaced with a new two stage national discernment process.

New Process Overview

Parish	Parish clergy identify and support people being open to God's call on their lives
Discernment	and then refer those called to commissioned, licensed or ordained ministry to the
	Director of Vocations
Diocesan	All candidates regardless of potential vocation will see both the Director of
Discernment	Vocations and the Sponsoring Bishop for an initial assessment.
Phase 1	They will then normally work with a Vocations Advisor to help clarify their
	potential vocation before returning to the Director of Vocations for a progress
	meeting.
	Candidates for ordained ministry will then be sent on placement to a different
	parish for about one month.
	Candidates will also work with an ADDO to complete their preparation for the
	National Stage 1 assessment.
National	This is a non-residential interview day with six short 15 minute interviews using
Stage 1	supportive creative interview techniques. It is focused on the foundations for all
	ministry: Love for God, Love for People and Call.
	The output is a short report highlighting the candidate's strengths and areas to
	work on. No determinative recommendations ae made at this time.
Diocesan	Candidates work with the ADDO to build on the report from the National Stage 1.
Discernment	They also work on the remaining areas of the discernment grid.
Phase 2	When ready, candidates are referred for two interviews with the Examining
	Chaplains, who will interview in pairs.
	The Examining Chaplains provide the Sponsoring Bishop with a concise report
	from each interview.
	The Sponsoring Bishop interviews each candidate to decide whether to send them
	to the National Stage 2 discernment process.
National	Candidates will have two interviews and one team exercise.
Stage 2	The output is a short report with 5 possible outcomes:
	Recommended for training
	Recommended for training with advice
	Recommended for training with conditions
	Not yet recommended for training
	Not recommended
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
