

Session 2 – The Sending Jesus

LEADER'S NOTES

Before you Start...

This course is intended to require minimum preparation. Before you start all you need to do is:

- Set out the room or space and provide tea and coffee
- Have a means of playing the video talk. It's on the Diocesan website or on the Fruitful app. Or you can just read it out.
- Decide which hymn or song you want to use. You can either play it, read it or the group can sing it.

Gathering

Welcome the group back for session 2. If anyone is new to the group, make sure everyone introduces themselves. Ask if anyone has any reflections on last week's session.

Prayer

Leave a short time of silence for people to gather their thoughts and then open with this or another prayer:

Heavenly Father,
you reveal yourself to us in your Son Jesus Christ.
We thank you for this precious time of prayer and study.
As we attend to your Word and listen to each other,
help us to learn more about your Son Jesus
and come to a deeper understanding of his saving work
Above all help us to know him for ourselves,
to love him,
to trust him,
and to offer him our hearts.
For you live and reign with Him and the Holy Spirit.
One god For ever and ever.
Amen.

Introduction

Introduce the session in these or other words.

A reminder that in this course we want to do two things.

First we want to know *about* Jesus, in other words grow in our understanding of who he is, what he has come to do and how he sets us free.

But second we want to *know* Jesus, in other words explore what it means to be in a deeper relationship with him and to offer our whole lives to him

This week our theme is the Sending Jesus.

Bible Study

This week's passage is from Acts Chapter 8 verses 26 to 40. It is part of the story of Philip.

Read the passage slowly and clearly.

²⁶Then an angel of the Lord said to Philip, 'Get up and go towards the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza.' (This is a wilderness road.) ²⁷So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. ²⁹Then the Spirit said to Philip, 'Go over to this chariot and join it.' ³⁰So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, 'Do you understand what you are reading?' ³¹He replied, 'How can I, unless someone guides me?' And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. ³²Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

'Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter,
 and like a lamb silent before its shearer,
 so he does not open his mouth.

³³In his humiliation justice was denied him.
 Who can describe his generation?
 For his life is taken away from the earth.'

³⁴The eunuch asked Philip, 'About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?' ³⁵Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. ³⁶As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, 'Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?' ³⁸He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. ³⁹When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. ⁴⁰But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

Ask the following questions or others as you see fit:

- Use some words to describe Philip in this passage. What gives him so much energy?
- The Eunuch reads to Philip from Isaiah chapter 53. Who do you think that passage is about?
- Philip explained what the passage from Isaiah meant. Can you imagine what Philip might have said?
- Philip was bold in sharing his faith. What stops you from being as bold as him?

Video

Now watch the video. It can be seen on the Diocesan Website or on the Fruitful app.

Discussion – Reflecting on the Talk

These questions are intended to prompt conversation. You don't need to use all of them and you may have better questions that you think of yourself. Just go with the flow of the conversation and pick out the questions you most like.

- What struck you in that talk? Did anything challenge you?
- Can you try and explain what motivates you in living the Christian life and being part of a Church family?
- Can you think of a time when Jesus has interrupted your life and caused you to go somewhere or do something you didn't expect?
- When you think about the cross of Jesus, what memories, words or feelings come to you?
- What words would you use to describe how Jesus sets you free by dying on the cross?
- What do you do in your daily life to live out the sacrificial love we see in Jesus?

Hymn or Song

It really helps some people to reflect on the words of a well-known hymn or song. Either play the hymn or song, sing it or read it out.

*This week there is a choice of hymns. A good contemporary song to use is *In Christ Alone* which is [here](#).*

*Or you can use *My Song is Love Unknown* which is [here](#).*

Afterwards ask people to reflect on a word or expression which especially spoke to them about knowing Jesus.

Prayer

Close with a time of prayer.

you set me at liberty when I was in trouble;

when I call upon the Lord, he will hear me.
