## With God there is always a second chance

September always feels like the start of the New Year. Much more so than January. There's something about the back to school phase that taps into deep memories where years were marked by a new class, un-scuffed shoes, and more homework.

I wonder if you've been fortunate enough to go away this summer? This also adds to the sense of coming back to a new start, while keeping up those routines which remind you of holiday.

The Bible contains The Truth, and that truth is that we are forgiven; God will always give you a second chance.

So I am grateful for new starts. Forgiveness sets people free. The past doesn't have to have a hold over us forever.
