I was thrilled to hear that Lancaster University was recently named 'International University of the Year' by The Times and The Sunday Times Good University Guide 2020.

This is on top of being ranked 8th overall in the national league tables. Lancaster is the only university to have a presence in sub-Saharan Africa, having opened a campus in Ghana: just one of many partnerships with leading universities in 24 countries.
