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An event worth waiting for

One of our daughters presented us with a slate about 9 months ago to countdown the number of weeks until the expected date of her child's birth.

As time went on and the numbers got smaller we were told the sex of the child (a boy) and then given progress on his weight and size until finally ... a rush into hospital for the baby to be induced only to discover she was already in the early stages of labour.





Then she had such a long labour the baby eventually had to be delivered with the aid of forceps. But the wait was worth it – a new bundle of joy for these first-time parents. And now, as any parent knows, the real work begins.

Advent Sunday (coincidentally the First of December this year) is the start in church of the not-solong wait for Christmas Day. Of course, the shops are there ahead of us with Christmas advertising starting even before Halloween (or All Hallows Eve as the church would call it).

In many churches the Advent Candles will be lit, one more for each of the four Sundays as we prepare to celebrate again the birth of the one who changed the world (and how we count the years).
