## Off-grid but switched on to real life

Earlier this summer my wife and I escaped the noise of modern life and headed to Northumbria, staying in a small lodge nestled in the woods near Bamburgh.

I'm not saying it was all rustic charm – in fact, it was a lovely architect-designed place with many modcons inside (no TV though)!

But it was still a retreat into simplicity; no constant notifications, no emails, just the quiet rustle of trees. It was a great place to relax, to take time out to pray and to be still, while feeling at one with nature.

One evening we sat watching a buzzard flying in endless circles as it searched for its latest meal. Another day we shared our breakfast time with some curious hares and later we saw some deer.

As we strolled local beaches; walked the trails and sat by the lodge fire, I found myself reflecting on how people lived in this region 150 years ago.
